



## OPERATIONAL BLUEPRINT FOR SCHOOL REENTRY 2020-21

Updated 8/11/2020

Under ODE’s **Ready Schools, Safe Learners** guidance, each school<sup>1</sup> has been directed to submit a plan to the district<sup>2</sup> in order to provide on-site and/or hybrid instruction. Districts must submit each school’s plan to the local school board and make the plans available to the public. This form is to be used to document a district’s, school’s or program’s plan to ensure students can return for the 2020-21 school year, in some form, in accordance with Executive Order 20-25(10). Staff, parents and students were surveyed in June. During July, survey results were shared and staff and parents were surveyed again. A third survey was sent to families after the July 22 announcement from Governor Brown that all children 5 and over must wear face masks indoors. North Marion Services Integration Team members assisted in gathering survey responses at food distribution sites during the month of July. Latinx staff members recruited families to participate on the Blueprint Committee. Both OSEA and UNME (OEA) Presidents served on the Blueprint Committee and provided feedback about staff impacts and also shared ideas to address concerns. District Special Education, Nurse, Food Services and Facilities and Maintenance Directors also participated. Our seven school board members participated in creation of the Blueprint Committee. Our Board Chair and Co-Chair served on the Blueprint Committee, another board member reviewed Health Protocols, and others served on different sub committees, including one Latinx member who reviewed the plan for Equity and support for all learners and their families.



Describe why you are selecting Comprehensive Distance Learning as the school's Instructional Model for the effective dates of this plan.

The North Marion School District selected the Comprehensive Distance Learning program due to official Marion County metrics regarding infection rates. Since our county and the zip codes in our attendance area exceed the percentage deemed safe for Hybrid Learning, we have transitioned our planning away from the Hybrid model to the Comprehensive Distance Learning model. The zip code with the highest rate in our attendance is 97071, where the rate is currently 22/10,000 residents. (OHA 8/1 report that included July metrics.) Currently, our county rate is well above the 5% required for face to face instruction. Our next two largest zip codes include Aurora and Hubbard and they also exceed the state's 5% infection rate.

Since our rates are not expected to dip below the 5% in the near future we have revised our fall program to not only meet the requirements put forth in guidance from ODE, OHA and the Governor's office, but also to meet

the needs of our families and staff. We have surveyed families three times since the end of the school year to determine the level of support they need to engage in CDL successfully with their children.

Our district created a K-12 Comprehensive Distance Learning Planning Team to implement a robust program based on the requirements outlined in both the Ready Schools, Safe Learner and Comprehensive Distance Learning Companion Guide. The team includes:

- teachers from each school,
- building administrators,
- elementary and secondary representatives from special education and English Language Development
- district staff

Care was taken to select candidates for the team that represent core content, specialist/CTE and elective instruction. Additionally, the team members represent a continuum of teaching experiences.

The foundational work of the team is to provide practical and systemic planning to implement a district model that reflects all requirements set forth by ODE guidance. As such, we can attest that the entire team has read the CDL Guidance and worked diligently to provide a robust K-12 model that embodies both the framing values and required elements represented in the guidance by the Oregon Department of Education.

The work of the team began through evaluation of the Guiding Principles, establishing a commitment to Equity, and an understanding of our Capacity Framework for Distance Learning. From this foundation, several subgroups were created to plan for the successful implementation of each requirement. A parent, licensed and classified staff surveys provided important data for consideration in this process. Informational sessions for the parent community provided valuable input for the planning process.

In evaluation of the spring Distance Learning for All experience, areas for improvement were identified using the Distance Learning Capacity Framework. The data collected is summarized below.

The analysis of the above data, based on the Capacity Framework, suggests that we need a targeted plan to move Student Efficacy toward proficiency. We plan to address this need in the following ways:

1. Ensure that every student has access to technology and access to the internet, using district resources as necessary.
2. Before instruction begins, provide every student and family with an orientation to Comprehensive Distance Learning and how to use the technology to access online instruction, access to the teacher during office hours, how to turn in assignments and how to access additional support in learning.
3. Provide “Technology Helpdesk” support through a staff member at each school.
4. Explain the roles and responsibilities of the parent, student and teacher, as outlined in the guidance.
5. Provide ongoing support, through Care and Connection to encourage student participation in learning.
6. Provide engaging lessons to activate the learner through instruction based on the tenets of Universal Design for Learning and Culturally Responsive Teaching.
7. Conference regularly with students and families to understand student assets, strengths and learning needs, adjusting instruction as appropriate.

In addition, we are looking at every possible solution to ensure that students have access to reliable internet service and a computer in order to access online learning. Like many Oregon districts, this continues to be our biggest challenge, due to lack of sufficient bandwidth in our area.

As soon as our county data allows for onsite learning for small student cohorts, the students who fall into this category will be prioritized for onsite learning. Other student populations prioritized for onsite

learning include students in grades K-3, Level 1 and 2 English Language Learners, special education students enrolled in self-contained programs.

The North Marion Comprehensive Distance Learning model will implement all state requirements, while providing for a continuity of care and connection with our students and families.

**Describe the school's plan, including the anticipated timeline, for returning to Hybrid Learning or On-Site Learning consistent with the *Ready Schools, Safe Learners* guidance.**

The transition from CDL to Hybrid Learning will occur in stages once the county metrics are at or below the 5% infection rate for three consecutive weeks. First, we will bring back our most vulnerable students. Our most vulnerable students include Special Education students in self-contained programs, students who are provided support through McKinney-Vento programs, English Language Learners through Level 2, and Counselor watch list students.

The next stage will include K-2 students, then grades 3-5, 6-8, and lastly 9-12.

A staggered start over a three week period will allow us to test and adapt our health and safety procedures as needed prior to having all students back in school. Our Blueprint for the Hybrid model currently includes all the required protocols for staff and students and monitoring procedures that will be used while in the Hybrid model. Data gathering and reporting will be done daily, weekly, and monthly as required. Reports will be generated and reviewed regularly, and updated OHA/ODE guidance will be implemented.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Establish a minimum of 35 square feet per person when determining room capacity. Calculate only with usable classroom space, understanding that desks and room set-up will require use of all space in the calculation. This also applies for professional development and staff gatherings.</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Support physical distancing in all daily activities and instruction, maintaining six feet between individuals to the maximum extent possible.</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Minimize time standing in lines and take steps to ensure that six feet of distance between students is maintained, including marking spacing on floor, one-way traffic flow in constrained spaces, etc.</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Schedule modifications to limit the number of students in the building (e.g., rotating groups by days or location, staggered schedules to avoid hallway crowding and gathering).</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Plan for students who will need additional support in learning how to maintain physical distancing requirements. 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- Communicate to staff at the start of On-Site instruction and at periodic intervals explaining infection control measures that are being implemented to prevent spread of disease.
- Develop protocols for communicating with students, families and staff who have come into close contact with a confirmed case.
  - The definition of exposure is being within 6 feet of a COVID-19 case for 15 minutes (or longer).
- Develop protocols for communicating immediately with staff, families, and the community when a new case(s) of COVID-19 is diagnosed in students or staff members, including a description of how the school or district is responding.
- Provide all information in languages and formats accessible to the school community.

COVID-19 symptoms are as follows:           <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Primary symptoms of concern: cough, fever (<i>temperature</i> greater than 100.4°F) or chills, shortness of breath, or difficulty breathing.</li> <li>● Note that muscle pain, headache, sore throat, new loss of taste or smell, diarrhea, nausea, vomiting, nasal congestion, and runny nose are also symptoms often associated with COVID-19. More information about COVID-19 symptoms is available <a href="#">from CDC</a>.</li> <li>● In addition to COVID-19 symptoms, students should be excluded from school for signs of other infectious diseases, per existing school policy and protocols. - For students with existing medical conditions and a physician's orders to not wear face coverings, or other health related concerns, schools/districts **must not** deny any in-person instruction.
- Schools and districts must comply with the established IEP/504 plan prior to the closure of in-person instruction in March of 2020.
  - If a student eligible for, or receiving services under a 504/IEP, **cannot** wear a face covering due to the nature of the disability, the school or district must:
    1. Review the 504/IEP to ensure access to instruction in a manner comparable to what was originally established in the student's plan including on-site instruction with accommodations or adjustments.
    2. Placement determinations cannot be made due solely to the inability to wear a face covering.
    3. Plans should include updates to accommodations and modifications to support students.
  - Students protected under ADA/IDEA, who abstain from wearing a face covering, or students whose families determine the student will not wear a face covering, the school or district must:
    1. Review the 504/IEP to ensure access to instruction in a manner comparable to what was originally established in the student's plan.
    2. The team must determine that the disability is not prohibiting the student from meeting the requirement.
      - If the team determines that the disability is prohibiting the student from meeting the requirement, follow the requirements for students eligible for, or receiving services under, a 504/IEP who cannot wear a face covering due to the nature of the disability,
      - If a student's 504/IEP plan included supports/goals/instruction for behavior or social emotional learning, the school team must evaluate the student's plan prior to providing instruction through Comprehensive Distance Learning.
    3. Hold a 504/IEP meeting to determine equitable access to educational opportunities which may include limited in-person instruction, on-site instruction with accommodations, or Comprehensive Distance Learning.
- For students not currently served under an IEP or 504, districts must consider whether or not student inability to consistently wear a face covering or face shield as required is due to a disability. Ongoing inability to meet this requirement may be evidence of the need for an evaluation to determine eligibility for support under IDEA or Section 504.
- If a staff member requires an accommodation for the face covering or face shield requirements, districts and schools should work to limit the staff member's proximity to students and staff to the extent possible to minimize the possibility of exposure.

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### 1i. ISOLATION AND QUARANTINE

- Consider required physical arrangements to reduce risk of disease transmission.
  - Plan for the needs of generally well students who need medication or routine treatment, as well as students who may show signs of illness.
  - [Additional guidance](#) for nurses and health staff.
- Students and staff who report or develop symptoms must be isolated in a designated isolation area in the school, with adequate space and staff supervision and symptom monitoring by a school nurse, other school-based health care provider or school staff until they are able to go home. Anyone providing supervision and symptom monitoring must wear appropriate face covering or face shields.
- School nurse and health staff in close contact with symptomatic individuals (less than 6 feet) should wear a medical-grade face mask. Other Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) may be needed depending on symptoms and care provided. Consult a nurse or health care professional regarding appropriate use of PPE. Any PPE used during care of a symptomatic individual should be properly removed and disposed of prior to exiting the care space.
  - After removing PPE, hands should be immediately cleaned with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, hands can be cleaned with an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains 60-95% alcohol.
  - If able to do so safely, a symptomatic individual should wear a face covering.
  - To reduce fear, anxiety, or shame related to isolation, provide a clear explanation of procedures, including use of PPE and handwashing.
- Establish procedures for safely transporting anyone who is sick to their home or to a health care facility.
- Staff and students who are ill must stay home from school and must be sent home if they become ill at school, particularly if they have COVID-19 symptoms. Refer to table in ["Planning for COVID-19 Scenarios in Schools."](#)
- Involve school nurses, School Based Health Centers, or staff with related experience (Occupational or Physical Therapists) in development of protocols and assessment of symptoms (where staffing exists).
- Record and monitor the students and staff being isolated or sent home for the LPHA review.



## 2. Facilities and School Operations

Some activities and areas will have a higher risk for spread (e.g., band, choir, science labs, locker rooms). When engaging in these activities within the school setting, schools will need to consider additional physical distancing or conduct the activities outside (where feasible). Additionally, schools should consider sharing explicit risk statements for instructional and extra-curricular activities requiring additional considerations (see section 5f of the **Ready Schools, Safe Learners** guidance).

### 2a. ENROLLMENT

(Note: Section 2a does not apply to private schools.)

- Enroll all students (including foreign exchange students) following the standard Oregon Department of Education guidelines.
- The temporary suspension of the 10-day drop rule does not change the rules for the initial enrollment date for students:
  - The ADM enrollment date for a student is the first day of the student's actual attendance.
  - A student with fewer than 10 days of absence at the beginning of the school year may be counted in membership prior to the first day of attendance, but not prior to the first calendar day of the school year.
  - If a student does not attend during the first 10 session days of school, the student's ADM enrollment date must reflect the student's actual first day of attendance.
  - Students who were anticipated to be enrolled, but who do not attend at any time must not be enrolled and submitted in ADM.
- If a student has stopped attending for 10 or more days, districts must continue to try to engage the student. At a minimum, districts must attempt to contact these students and their families weekly to either encourage attendance or receive confirmation that the student has transferred or has withdrawn from school. This includes students who were scheduled to start the school year, but who have not yet attended.
- When enrolling a student from another school, schools must request documentation from the prior school within 10 days of enrollment per OAR 581-021-0255 to make all parties aware of the transfer. Documentation obtained directly from the family does not relieve the school of this responsibility. After receiving documentation from another school that a student has enrolled, drop that student from your roll.
- Design attendance policies to account for students who do not attend in-person due to student or family health and safety concerns.
- When a student has a pre-excused absence or COVID-19 absence, the school district should reach out to offer support at least weekly until the student has resumed their education.
- When a student is absent beyond 10 days and meets the criteria for continued enrollment due to the temporary suspension of the 10 day drop rule, continue to count them as absent for those days and include those days in your Cumulative ADM reporting.

**2b. ATTENDANCE**

- Schools with HVAC systems should evaluate the system to minimize indoor air recirculation (thus maximizing fresh outdoor air) to the extent possible. Schools that do not have mechanical ventilation systems should, to the extent possible, increase natural ventilation by opening windows and doors before students arrive and after students leave, and while students are present.
  - Consider running ventilation systems continuously and changing the filters more frequently. Do not use fans if they pose a safety or health risk, such as increasing exposure to pollen/allergies or exacerbating asthma symptoms. Consider using window fans or box fans positioned in open windows to blow fresh outdoor air into the classroom via one window, and indoor air out of the classroom via another window. Fans should not be used in rooms with closed windows and doors, as this does not allow for fresh air to circulate.
  - Consider the need for increased ventilation in areas where students with special health care needs receive medication or treatments.
  - Facilities should be cleaned and disinfected at least daily to prevent transmission of the virus from surfaces (see [CDC's guidance on disinfecting public spaces](#)).
  - Consider modification or enhancement of building ventilation where feasible (see [CDC's guidance on ventilation and filtration](#) and [American Society of Heating, Refrigerating, and Air-Conditioning Engineers' guidance](#)).

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**2k. HEALTH SERVICES**

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

<p><input type="checkbox"/> In accordance with <a href="#">ORS 336.071</a> and <a href="#">OAR 581-022-2225</a> all schools (including those operating a Comprehensive Distance Learning model) are required to instruct students on emergency procedures. Schools that operate an On-Site or Hybrid model need to instruct and practice drills on emergency procedures so that students and staff can respond to emergencies.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● At least 30 minutes in each school month must be used to instruct students on the emergency procedures for fires, earthquakes (including tsunami drills in appropriate zones), and safety threats.</li> <li>● Fire drills must be conducted monthly.</li> <li>● Earthquake drills (including tsunami drills and instruction for schools in a tsunami hazard zone) must be conducted two times a year.</li> <li>● Safety threats including procedures related to lockdown, lockout, shelter in place and evacuation and other appropriate actions to take when there is a threat to safety must be conducted two times a year.</li> </ul> <p><input type="checkbox"/> Drills can and should be carried out <u>as close as possible</u> to the procedures that would be used in an actual emergency. - Establish a proactive plan for daily routines designed to build self-regulation skills; self-regulation skill-building sessions can be short (5-10 minutes), and should take place at times when the student is regulated and/or is not demonstrating challenging behaviors.
- Ensure all staff are trained to support de-escalation, provide lagging skill instruction, and implement alternatives to restraint and seclusion.
- Ensure that staff are trained in effective, evidence-based methods for developing and maintaining their own level of self-regulation and resilience to enable them to remain calm and able to support struggling students as well as colleagues.
- Plan for the impact of behavior mitigation strategies on public health and safety requirements:
  - Student elopes from area
    - If staff need to intervene for student safety, staff should:
      - Use empathetic and calming verbal interactions (i.e. “This seems hard right now. Help me understand... How can I help?”) to attempt to re-regulate the student without physical intervention.
      - Use the least restrictive interventions possible to maintain physical safety for the student and staff.
      - Wash hands after a close interaction.
      - Note the interaction on the appropriate contact log.
    - \*If unexpected interaction with other stable cohorts occurs, those contacts must be noted in the appropriate contact logs.
  - Student engages in behavior that requires them to be isolated from peers and results in a room clear.
    - If students leave the classroom:
      - Preplan for a clean and safe alternative space that maintains physical safety for the student and staff
      - Ensure physical distancing and separation occur, to the maximum extent possible.
      - Use the least restrictive interventions possible to maintain physical safety for the student and staff.
      - Wash hands after a close interaction.
      - Note the interaction on the appropriate contact log.
    - \*If unexpected interaction with other stable cohorts occurs, those contacts must be noted in the appropriate contact logs.
  - Student engages in physically aggressive behaviors that preclude the possibility of maintaining physical distance and/or require physical de-escalation or intervention techniques other than restraint or seclusion (e.g., hitting, biting, spitting, kicking, self-injurious behavior).
    - If staff need to intervene for student safety, staff should:
      - Maintain student dignity throughout and following the incident.
      - Use empathetic and calming verbal interactions (i.e. “This seems hard right now. Help me understand... How can I help?”) to attempt to re-regulate the student without physical intervention.
      - Use the least restrictive interventions possible to maintain physical safety for the student and staff
      - Wash hands after a close interaction.
      - Note the interaction on the appropriate contact log.



- \*If unexpected interaction with other stable cohorts occurs, those contacts must be noted in the appropriate contact logs.
- Ensure that spaces that are unexpectedly used to deescalate behaviors are appropriately cleaned and sanitized after use before the introduction of other stable cohorts to that space.

**Protective Physical Intervention**

- Reusable Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) must be cleaned/sanitized after every episode of physical intervention (see section 2j of the **Ready Schools, Safe Learners** guidance: Cleaning, Disinfection, and Ventilation).
